

Pastor's Perspective

One of the constant and often disturbing themes in the Bible is the theme of judgment. This is not a pleasant topic and one which modern Christians have often tried to run away from or, more likely, intellectually dispose of. A judgmental God just isn't very appealing, especially in our "Don't worry...Be happy" kind of world.

Judgment has also been traditionally thought of in some pretty hard to believe ways. The image of an angry God, sitting high upon a throne, launching lightning bolts of judgment and wrath just doesn't wash with the modern day, educated, rational thinker. Such a God-image even seems kind of silly.

Yet, I have been thinking about divine judgment as of late with every new report that comes out in regard to the environmental health of our planet — God's creation. Dire rates of extinction, rain forest depletion, climate disruption, super storms, coal ash and just plain old corporate pollution in all its forms makes for a pretty bleak picture. Experts from all over the world are telling us that time is running out.

Is all of this God's judgment? It sounds odd simply to ask the question. But something is happening to the planet that seems to demand a response. Let's begin with judgment.


I do not believe that God renders judgment in a case-by-case manner. There is no proof for this and too much injustice in the world for such a scenario to make any sense. But the biblical narrative seems to point to a **judgment that is written into both creation and the social order**. In this way, if we keep violating the created order, judgment will be revealed in the consequences of that which we violate. If the social and economic order is based on greed, then social chaos will, sooner or later, be the consequence. If the created order is constantly used, exploited, and polluted, then creation chaos will, sooner or later, be the consequence. I am fearful that this is the historical moment to which we have arrived.

Thankfully, the biblical narrative has within it the answer to divine judgment. It is called **repentance** and it means to **'turn around'**; it is no easy task.

I invite the members and friends of Peace Church to begin to think and pray about **what repentance looks like in 2018?** How can we avoid God's ultimate judgment which promises to leave in its wake a creation of chaos, social injustice, and environmental destruction? What corporate (human family) behaviors must we cease in order to stop the consequential judgment of our behaviors as a species?

We have been warned that the clock is ticking. Perhaps it is time for us to do some thinking... and some acting.

A note from Elisabeth...

October began with World Communion Sunday. Such a special day when Christians all around the world are sharing in the Lord's

Supper! In our hymnal on page 827 are listed the hymns that focus on the Lord's Supper. Some of them are grouped together from pages 384 – 430, and then there are others throughout the hymnal that also reference the bread and wine and Communion.

October's Hymn of the Month is page 330, *Alleluia! Hear God's Story*. The words were written by Mary Anne Parrott (Words ©1995 Chalice Press; adapt. © Rosalind Rusbridge). The first stanza directly speaks of the Communion elements. Throughout the hymn are words celebrating our Christian faith. The Gospel message is such a reason to rejoice, and music and movement are beautiful ways to express our joy.

The tune for this hymn should sound familiar. Look down in the lower right corner where you see the hymn tune title, □ ZLOBIE LEZY which is a Polish folk melody adapted by A. E. Rusbridge. In the Tune Names index on page 842, this hymn tune is listed for three hymns. In addition to this one, there is a Christmas song and an Easter song that are sung with this melody.

And then November – a month focused on gratitude and thanksgiving.

As our Hymn of the Month for November we will use page 605, *For Each Day of Life We Thank You*. This is a hymn of thanks and service. Please read and meditate upon the words as we enter the season of thanksgiving, and let's all truly thank God as we wake up each morning.

If you look down in the right hand corner of page 605 you will see the hymn tune, *Charlestown*. By learning page 605, we are also learning the tune for page 670. Please be sure to also read the words on page 670, *All Who Love and Serve Your City*, and pray for our city and its leaders.

MISSION OF THE MONTH



The November Mission of the Month is the Greensboro Urban Ministry Holiday Honor Card. This year is the 31st anniversary of The Honor Card, designed by artist William “Bill” Mangum. Since 1988, this program has raised more than \$7 million for people in need in North Carolina. Last year at Greensboro Urban Ministry, the Honor Card raised more than \$311,000, exceeding the goal of \$300,000 for the 30th anniversary.

The theme of this year’s card, “Almost Home”, is filled with serenity and peacefulness in the snow-laden landscape. It also reminds us that we are on a journey through life, simply passing through. With your support of the Honor Card program, funds raised are used to assist our neighbors in need with food, shelter and solutions. (The 2018 Honor Card design will be revealed on Friday, October 26, after the printing of this newsletter. We will have the design in the bulletin in the coming weeks while the card is available.)

For a minimum \$5 donation per card, buyers receive a beautiful card that is given in the person’s honor for the holidays – and 100% of the donation goes directly to help the homeless and hungry in their community.



Peace Church Recipe Corner

BAKED APPLE FRENCH TOAST CASSEROLE

8 cups day-old French bread, torn into chunks
7 large eggs
2 cups milk
2 tsp. vanilla
¼ tsp salt
4 apples, cored, peeled and sliced
4 Tbsp. butter
⅔ cup brown sugar
1 tsp cinnamon



Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a 9x13" casserole dish, then add shredded bread. Make sure to cover the entire bottom of the dish evenly, then set aside. In a medium-sized mixing bowl, whisk eggs, then add milk, vanilla and salt. Pour mixture over bread and set aside.

In a large skillet over medium heat, combine butter and apples. Stir ingredients until they are evenly coated, then cover pan to let the apples steam and soften for about 3 to 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Uncover, then stir in cinnamon and brown sugar. Continue cooking until tender and caramelized—about 3 minutes. Next, carefully pour apples into a casserole dish on top of shredded bread. Using a wooden spoon, gently push ingredients around to distribute evenly.

Bake for 45 minutes, or until nicely browned on top. Remove from the oven then top with maple syrup. Enjoy!

Notes: Prepare this delicious baked apple French toast casserole the night before you're ready to please a crowd! It's easy to make and is a perfect recipe to serve in cooler fall months.

Use Macintosh apples for the best sweet and tart flavor.

Memorial contributions may be made to Peace United Church of Christ, or in memory of Dorn, take time to do a good deed for someone.




