#### A Note from Elisabeth

Come, let us sing for joy to the Lord; let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before him with thanksgiving and extol him with music and song. Psalm 95: 1-2 (NIV)

Peace is following the directive given above from the Psalms to "sing for joy to the Lord." On January 22nd at 9:30 am in the sanctuary, we began practicing with a group of 9 people in preparation to sing in worship on February 5th. We would love to see this number grow. February 5th is a first Sunday when we traditionally celebrate Communion, so it is a special day to re-introduce a singing ensemble. The plan is to sing "In Remembrance" which we have sung before. Fortunately, it is on our OneLicense, so we can legally sing it on the livestream. Special music is something we have to check, not just hymns. Just

because a title is on one of our licenses doesn't mean our arrangement is.

The current plan is to rehearse on Sunday mornings from 9:30 – 10:15, and sing about once a month for worship. Please know that you are welcome to join us. It has been my belief through the years that a choir should reflect the membership of the church. Therefore, you will hopefully see representation of all in the choir.

As we move through February, we come to the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is February 22nd in anticipation of Easter on April 9th . During Lent, music is usually more contemplative and focused on personal reflection and penitence. Our hymnal index only lists five hymns specifically for Lent beginning with page 179, Forty Days and Forty Nights, which beautifully describes our journey through Lent. Please try using it as part of your meditation as you prepare your heart for the resurrection. Once again, remember you are invited to come sing at 9:30 on Sunday mornings, and if you have any questions please call me, e-mail me, or talk to me at church.

## Solar Power... at Peace Church?

A conversation has begun about possibly investing in solar panels to help power our church building. On the heels of a generous gift given to the church with the expressed intent of it being used for solar panels, the Consistory has approved the exploration of what it would entail to purchase and install a solar panel system.

As a first effort to gain some knowledge of solar panels, we will be having a meeting with Armghan "Mani" Aslam of the 8M Solar Company. This is an open meeting for all members and friends of Peace Church which will take place on February 3rd at 4PM in the Preparation Room.

On January 13th, Pastor Tom, Jane Ford, Russ Haver, and Elisabeth Penry met with Rev. Paul Davis of Congregational United Church of Christ to see firsthand their new solar panel system and learn what it cost them, various rebates and grants they acquired to lower the cost, and what they hope to save in electrical bills over the long run.

At this time 8M Solar Company has provided us with an estimated cost for a system appropriate for our building at \$93,275.00. Peace Church has qualified for 30% Federal Tax Credit of \$27,983.00 as well as a Duke Power Rebate of \$30,000.00 rendering the net cost of this system at \$35,293.00 with an energy offset of 86%.

Please join us on Friday, February 3rd at 4PM in the Preparation Room for this very important meeting to help us assess the viability of solar power for Peace Church. See you there!

#### Graham Cracker Toffee Bars

Ingredients: 1 stick of butter

1 cup packed brown sugar 2 packs of graham crackers 1 cup of chopped pecans

#### Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°. Arrange graham crackers on parchment paper on 15x13 tray. Melt stick of butter over low heat. Add 1 cup of packed brown sugar to butter. Stir over low-med heat until it comes to a full rolling boil. Boil 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add in chopped pecans. Pour over crackers and spread out. Bake at 350° for 7 minutes. Cool 10 minutes, cut into pieces. Cool completely and store in an airtight container.

Can also top with broken Hershey bar pieces after it comes out of the oven and smooth melted chocolate.

## General Synod 34

"Making All Things New" will be the theme of the 34th biennial General Synod of the United Church of Christ, scheduled for June 30–July 4, 2023, in Indianapolis. The scripture verse is from Isaiah 43:18-19: "Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

The logo, said the Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson, General Synod administrator, is open to interpretation.

"A good logo makes you imagine, it makes you think, it makes you find yourself in it," she said. "With the logo design, we wanted to think about what 'newness' looks like – about something emerging – like a sunrise or a petal opening – something that's welcoming. "There are clearly images of creation, of green, a wave, a sunrise, a flower. It speaks of creating and created – and points to possibility. We want people to look at the logo and see, from their own experience, something new."

#### What things are new:

"Making All Things New" was confirmed March 10 by vote of the 13-member General Synod Program and Planning Committee and presented to the United Church of Christ Board for affirmation at its March 11 meeting via Zoom. "The General Synod Program and Planning Committee hopes that 'Making All Things New' evokes a post-pandemic time," said Bob Sandman, a member of Lakeview UCC, Maineville, Ohio, and General Synod moderator. "And the theme prepares the way for the election of a new general minister and president. In Isaiah 43:19, God says, 'I am about to do a new thing.' So the logo shows what could be a rising sun or a blooming flower over flowing springs."

"'Making All Things New' resonated with all the members of the GSPPC," Thompson said. "Coming out of the pandemic, we see something new emerging, not just as a church, but as people. We may also see some new things about how we approach Synod, with General Synod 34. "What they are, we don't know yet. We've learned so much, putting on the virtual General Synod last year. How will that enhance the experience the next time?"

For example, Thompson said, "Prerecording the educational intensives was a wonderful experience. We might want to continue to prerecord those informational events so all delegates can access all the intensives, not just those for the committees on which they serve." She noted that delegates were not running from Point A to Point B to be informed about more than one resolution during the virtual 2021 Synod. That's worth thinking about. Going forward, Synod planners are also thinking about folks who may not be able to attend in person, but want the event experience.

#### Defining 'hybrid'

With the logo, theme and scripture determined, Thompson and her team can start to plan, structure, design – and define – the event. "A hybrid General Synod is still to be defined," she said. "The event has long been live-streamed, but with the pandemic, live streaming has been more embedded in our consciousness as a way of engagement. We are looking at what we layer with streaming to make it more engaging to others who are not participating live with us on site."



## Cuba Study 2023

On Friday, February 10th, an early morning flight will depart Miami International Airport with a group of 19 participants making up the 2023 UCC Cuba Study Seminar. Hailing from as far away as Juneau, Alaska and O'ahu, Hawaii and as nearby as Chapel Hill, North Carolina, this years' group represents the first UCC contingent to visit Cuba since early 2020.

For nearly three years now Cuba has been struggling with a number of factors that have created very difficult living conditions for the Cuban people. Covid led to the complete shutdown of the tourist sector, the primary engine of the Cuban economy. The 60-year-old U.S. economic blockade of Cuba was strengthened once again by the previous U.S. administration with over 400 new restrictions placed on the Cuban government, very few of which have been removed by the Biden Administration. Times have been tough, to say the least.

Despite these troubles, Cuba was able to develop three Covid-19 vaccinations which were made available to their entire population. The tourist trade is opening up again, and new economic deals have been negotiated with various nations for food supplies, fuel, and some medicines.

Our trip will have many of the components of previous years, including a 5 day stay in Santiago with Revs. Elmer and Gisela Lavastida and the staff at the Lavastida Center. It will be great to be with our Cuban brothers and sisters again, and to re-establish many deep friendships that we have developed over the years.

The financial contributions given during January will be hand delivered to the Lavastida Center staff when Pastor Tom and Kim and the entire group are down there in February. This promises to be a great reunion! Please pray for Pastor Tom and Kim as they embark on this important seminar.
