

Pastor's Perspective

Yesterday, there was yet another mass school shooting in our nation, this time in Nashville. It is now normal: Sad, but the norm. Kind of like the cross that we bear almost on a daily basis. As our Lenten season comes to a close and we enter into the celebration of Easter, let us pause for a moment to reflect upon the often stated idea that "without the cross, there is no Easter."

The cross, often in our contemporary society identified with a shiny piece of jewelry or with the suffering that God somehow intended for Jesus on our behalf, was, first and foremost, a form of Roman capital punishment. This mode of death was reserved for chronically defiant slaves and those who challenged Roman rule. If the Jewish authorities alone had wanted to kill Jesus, they would have used stoning. Instead, Rome nailed Jesus, along with perhaps thousands of others in the first century, to a cross.

Crucifixion was designed to be very brutal and very public. The victim was naked and most often took many days to die. Historians of the Roman Empire tell us that many times the body of those crucified was dragged off the cross and eaten by packs of wild dogs. Jesus could have been quietly killed in a back alley or a prison cell if the Roman authorities simply wanted to get rid of him. But Jesus was crucified because it made a public statement; it said to others who might be tempted to step out of line "this is what we do to those who oppose us." It was statesponsored terrorism, torture, and death as a social and political deterrent.

The fact of the matter is that Jesus' passion got him killed. his suffering and death. In this way, Iesus did not die for the sins of the world but was killed **because of** the sins of the world. The injustice of the Roman domination world. 

"The Sacred Depth of Nature": A Program for Study & Reflection

The Rev. Jay Abernathy will be leading a Soup & Study program based on Dr. Ursula Goodenough's book called The Sacred Depth of Nature. This four-part series encourages discussion of the dramatic effects of modern science on our understanding of religion in our modern world. We will use Professor Ursula Goodenough's book as both resource and inspiration.

The four sessions are:

Wednesday, April 19th: "From Nothing to Something." How physics explains how the universe is put together (Intro, Ch. 1-2).

Wednesday, April 26th: "From Something to Life." How parts of the inanimate world came to life—the inspiring story of biology (Ch. 3-7).

Wednesday, May 3rd: "From Life to Human Beings." How evolution led to a totally new creature, distinct in certain ways from all other creatures (Ch. 8-10).

Wednesday, May 10th: "From Humanity to God."

Since "humans are made in the image of God," what all this science tells us about God (Ch. 11-12).

The short introductions will set the stage for discussion, moving through the text, covering the parts that interest those in attendance. The book is available from Amazon and other choices as a trade paperback. Please note that this will be a "soup & study" format with soup/bread served at 6:00pm with study/conversation beginning at 6:30pm, in the Preparation Room. Please sign-up in the narthex.

Rev. Dr. Jay Abernathy is a retired Unitarian Universalist minister, ordained in 1974. His degrees are from Anglican (Canada) and Episcopalian seminaries, but they are not totally to be blamed for his various heresies. For decades he gave 2-3 sermons a year on topics relating science and religion, as he tried to grapple with those ideas that distinguish modern religion from ancient religion. Dr. Goodenough's book deserves some study, but don't get bogged down in the biochemistry details; get comfortable with the big picture first.

Investing in our Planet

The theme for Earth Day 2023 is "Invest in Our Planet". What does invest in our planet mean? Investing doesn't always mean a monetary donation to an environmental organization. We can dedicate our time, resources, and energy to solving climate change and other environmental issues. Here is one way we can invest in our planet that we may not have thought about. <u>Clothing.</u> The following is information from <u>EARTHDAY.ORG</u> on how we can make a difference in our habits for the

earth. Fast fashion has completely revolutionized the apparel industry, but not for the better. Behind every piece of clothing in a store, there is an industry stripping the Earth of its limited resources and exploiting the labor force that works in its garment factories. Tremendous waste characterizes this industry as it depletes healthy soil, contaminates fresh water sources, pollutes the air we breathe, defiles our oceans, destroys forests and damages eco-systems and the health of their biodiversity. **Sustainable fashion** refers to a clothing supply chain that is ecologically and socially responsible. It aims to reorient the industry and consumers away from the fast fashion model and toward sustainable practices in sourcing, production, distribution, marketing, and consumption.



GET THE FACTS

- The fashion industry produces 150 billion garments a year and 87% (40 million tons) end up in a landfill where they smolder and pollute the air or an incinerator.
- Only 1% of all discarded clothing is actually recycled.
- The average person today buys 60 percent more items of clothing than they did 15 years ago but keep them for only half as long. The average garment may be worn as few as ten times before disposal.
- Fashion is one of the most polluting of all industries. Clothing is manufactured with highly toxic dyes and heavy metals that are flushed into clean water streams, rivers and aquifers where they sicken people and animals, harm ecosystems, and cause biodiversity loss.
- Non-organic cotton farming heavily depletes and degrades soil. It is one of the world's most pesticide intensive crops. These affect the health of farmers and populations nearby. The toxic farm runoff contaminates fresh waters, wetlands and aquifers and threatens biodiversity and eco-systems. 62% of all clothing is made partially or entirely of synthetic fibers such as polyester which is a crude oil derivative. Petroleum is a non-renewable resource with significant negative impacts on the environment.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Educate yourself about sustainable clothing.
- Buy less and shop for quality over quantity.
- Choose natural materials organic cotton, linen, or hemp.
- Buy 100% recycled fabrics 100% recycled polyester, viscose (rayon), etc.
- Research brands to identify those that are ethical and practice transparency and sustainability.
- Buy secondhand clothing.
- Swap clothes with a clothes swap group or start a swap yourself.
- Learn how to repair your clothes yourself. The longer clothes are kept, the lower their emissions footprint.

Peeps Triple Chocolate Cake

INGREDIENTS

- PAM[®] Baking Spray
- 1 package (15.25 oz each) Duncan Hines[®] Classic Devil's Food Cake Mix 1 cup water
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 container (16 oz each) Duncan Hines® Creamy Chocolate Frosting
- 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips, divided
- 1/3 cup heavy (whipping) cream
- 1 cup sweetened flaked coconut
- 1 drop green food coloring
- 9 PEEPS[®] Delights[™] Marshmallow Chicks
- 1/2 cup jelly beans

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray two 8-inch round pans with baking spray.
- Blend cake mix, water, eggs, and oil in a large bowl with an electric mixer on low speed until moistened, about 30 seconds. Beat on medium speed 2 minutes. Pour into pans.
- Bake 24 to 28 minutes, until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack 15 minutes, remove from pans and cool completely.
- Place one cake layer on serving plate. Frost top with about 1/2-cup chocolate frosting. Top with second cake layer and frost entire cake with remaining frosting. Refrigerate 15 minutes.
- Place 1/2-cup chocolate chips in small bowl. Microwave cream in a separate small microwave-safe bowl 30 seconds, until steaming hot. Pour hot cream over chocolate chips, let stand 30 seconds, whisk until smooth. Pour ganache on top of cold cake and use a spoon to push the ganache to the edge and drip down the sides. Refrigerate 15 minutes.
- Place remaining 1/2-cup chocolate chips in small microwave-safe bowl. Microwave 30 seconds, stir. Continue microwaving in 15-second increments until melted, stir until smooth. Spoon chocolate inside a large two egg-shaped silicone mold halves and use the back of the spoon to push it up the sides. Refrigerate 10 minutes, until firm.
- Place coconut and a drop of green food coloring in a resealable food storage bag, seal and shake until coconut is dyed green. Spread coconut over top of cake.
- Unmold chocolate egg and place in the center of the cake. Place PEEPS® Delights[™] Marshmallow Chicks around the top of the cake. Decorate with jelly beans, slice and serve!
