And it is May already!

We would also welcome YOU to join us at 9:30 on Sunday mornings to sing God’s praises!

This month there are two Sundays where we have a special emphasis – Mother’s Day, May 12th, and Pentecost, May 19th.

In the past in my May newsletter articles, I’ve suggested that maybe you sing with your mother or sing your mother’s favorite hymn or song in her honor/memory. This year when I was working on this article, I decided to turn it around and ask my own daughters what they thought my favorite hymn is. They have been around music and hymns their entire lives, and neither one knew. They suggested several meaningful and beautiful hymns that I really like, but not my favorite. We did have a lot of fun with the text conversations. So again, I suggest, if possible, ask your mother what hymns are special to her and why – it just may provide a lot of enjoyment and insight.

On Pentecost Sunday, the choir will be singing Holy Spirit Rain Down by Russell Fragar (© 1997 Hillsong MP Songs/ CCLI License # 1217597). This is a new anthem for us with powerful words about our need for the Holy Spirit both as individuals

and as a church community. As we approach Pentecost Sunday, let’s pray for a new awareness of the fire of the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our church fellowship.

Pentecost



Pentecost, (Pentecost from Greek *pentecostē*, “50th day”), major festival in the Christian church, celebrated on the Sunday that falls on the 50th day of Easter. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and other disciples following the Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus Christ (Acts of the Apostles, chapter 2), and it marks the beginning of the Christian church’s mission to the world.

The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot) was primarily a thanksgiving for the firstfruits of the wheat harvest, but it was later associated with a remembrance of the Law given by God to Moses on Mount Sinai. The church’s transformation of the Jewish feast to a Christian festival was thus related to the belief that the gift of the Holy Spirit to the followers of Jesus was the firstfruits of a new dispensation that fulfilled and succeeded the old dispensation of the Law.

When the festival was first celebrated in the Christian church is not known, but it was mentioned in a work from the Eastern church, the *Epistola Apostolorum*, in the 2nd century. In the 3rd century it was mentioned by Origen, theologian and head of the catechetical school in Alexandria, and by Tertullian, Christian priest and writer of Carthage.

In the early church, Christians often referred to the entire 50-day period beginning with Easter as Pentecost. Baptism was administered both at the beginning (Easter) and end (the day of Pentecost) of the Paschal season. Eventually, Pentecost became a more popular time for baptism than Easter in northern Europe, and in England the feast was commonly called White Sunday (Whitsunday) for the special white garments worn by the newly baptized. In The First Prayer Book of Edward VI (1549), the feast was officially called Whitsunday, and this name has continued in Anglican churches. In Catholic and other

Western churches, priests often wear red vestments during Pentecost to symbolize the “tongues of fire” that descended on the disciples from the Holy Spirit; members of the congregation also wear red in some traditions, and the altar is commonly dressed in a red frontal cloth.

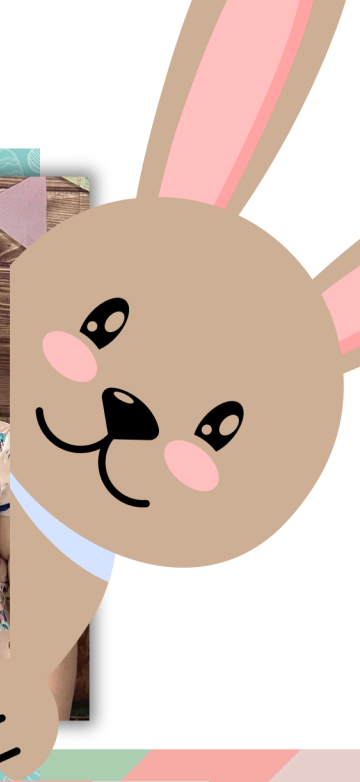

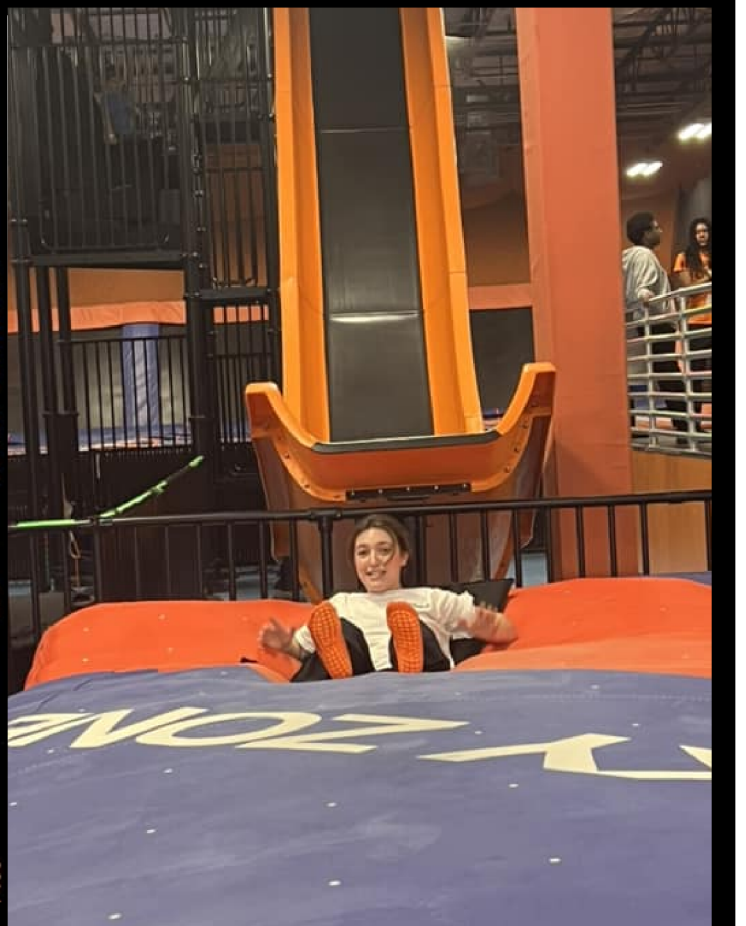

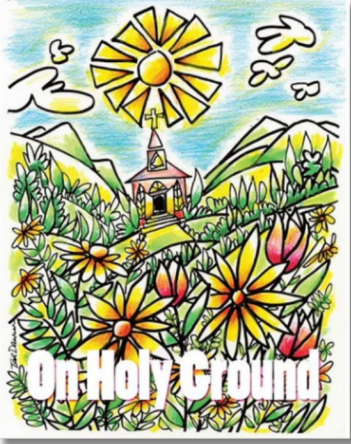


First Youth and Parent Outing a Success

Olivia Jolliff to Lead Peace Mission Efforts

(Note: After over 30 incredible years leading our mission efforts at Peace Church, Cindy Spillers has elected to step down as Chair. Olivia Jolliff is stepping up to the plate!)



When Pastor Tom first asked that I consider joining the mission work at Peace, I was, admittedly, hesitant – with a full-time job, young children, and a doctoral degree in the works, time (and energy!) is a precious commodity. While I contemplated saying “thanks, but no thanks”, I thought about my favorite hymn “They Will Know We Are Christians By Our Love” and how we live out our faith through acts of love. I was then reminded of our Statement of Mission which calls on us to “promote the healing and well-being of the human family through acts of mission and justice”. Those who know me also know that I hold integrity – that is, demonstrating values through action – as a guiding principle, and while I may have an already full plate, I see joining the mission work at Peace as an integral opportunity to live out my steadfast commitment to social justice-oriented

mission work.

The United Church of Christ (UCC) embraces social justice mission work, recognizing it as central to its identity and mission. Rooted in the teachings of Jesus Christ and guided by principles of love, compassion, and equity, the UCC advocates for the liberation and empowerment of marginalized communities and works tirelessly to dismantle systems of oppression and injustice. I am excited about the ways in which our mission work at Peace can carry out this vision, particularly through action-based mission work.

While action-based missions and monetary missions are both valuable and can contribute to meaningful change, they differ in their focus, methods, and outcomes. Action-based mission work emphasizes direct involvement, hands-on engagement, and active participation in addressing social challenges. Much like the work currently being led by the wonderful Rhiannon with our youth, the action-based mission involves engaging with communities, building relationships, and working collaboratively to identify needs, develop solutions, and implement sustainable change that dismantles systems of inequity.

The emphasis in action-based mission work is on empowering communities, fostering self-reliance, and promoting systemic change. Rather than solely providing assistance from a distance, action-based mission work involves walking alongside communities, listening to their voices, and partnering with them to address the root causes of injustice and inequality. This approach recognizes the dignity and agency of individuals and seeks to build long-term, reciprocal relationships grounded in solidarity and mutual respect.

The End-of-Summer Splash last year provided a glimpse into the rewards of outreach and partnership with the Lindley community. Community building and acts of service are concrete actions that allow us to live out our faith in tangible ways, demonstrating God's love for the world. While no iteration of the missions work will come close to Cindy Spillers' legacy in leading missions at Peace, the future possibilities for Peace UCC to spread the word that God is love and to leave a visible mark in our community are boundless and exhilarating!

City of Greensboro Recognizes Church for Being Green

I wanted to reach out and let you know that you were recently nominated for a Live Green Award from the City of Greensboro's Office of Sustainability and Resilience and the Community Sustainability Council. While you were not selected as one of this year's winner, I wanted to let you know what was shared about your organization and thank you for the work that you do to positively impact our community.

- Currently installing a 95-panel solar power system which will be completed and "turned on" by April 1st, 2024.
- In partnership with the New Arrivals Institute (immigrant & refugee program), we created the "Growing Peace" children's learning/play area designed for youth to encounter nature by interacting with edible gardens, outdoor library among diverse plants, mud kitchen, large trees for natural shade, grassy play areas, all designed for children and youth to encounter and engage with nature. This play area is open at all times for neighborhood use (Sunset Hills & Lindley Park area).
- In partnership with the New Arrivals Institute, we built and facilitate the yearly planting and growing of a community garden located on the church grounds using rain water barrels to capture water from the church roof to then use on the garden. The garden harvest is shared among church and New Arrivals Institute families with some produce donated to local food banks.
- Working with Tiny Houses Greensboro, we sponsor styrofoam recycling with blue dumpster in our church parking lot for styrofoam collection which is then recycled and sold to help fund the Tiny Houses Greensboro program.
- Peace Church has a paper/plastic/newspaper recycling program situated throughout our church building encompassing all activities and groups that utilize our space.
- Plastic benches located at our front doors are made out of recycled plastic soda bottles.
- New trees are planted on the church property each year as well as new landscaping put in utilizing native plants and bushes.

On November 1, 1950, a group of dedicated Trustees celebrated the incorporation of the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds, now known as the Blowing Rock Conference Center. Through God's grace and the hard work of many individuals over the years, the Blowing Rock Conference Center is poised to celebrate its 75th anniversary in a little over a year. In good and bad times, we have remained a beacon of light, hope, rest, and

renewal for thousands of people.

As we have brushed off the dust of the pandemic, I am pleased to announce that we had a banner year in 2023. We are financially solvent and we have been able to continue to spend the needed funds to keep up the maintenance of our holy grounds. To aid in those accomplishments, I am thankful that the BRCC is fully staffed with a group of dedicated folks from all walks of life. Though some of the faces have changed, our philosophy of radical hospitality has not.

When I was hired in 2017 as the Executive Director of these sacred grounds, our charge was quite simple: to preserve the natural beauty of our campus, while also modernizing our meeting spaces and lodge rooms. Over the last 8 years, we have been able to do just that. We have continued to add the necessary technologies to our meeting spaces and common areas, we have renovated all of our family cottages, added new roofs to all of our buildings, maintained our youth spaces, and continued to repair and replace the infrastructure as needed. The last piece of this charge is to renovate and modernize the 51 Corriher lodge rooms that so many of our guests use.

Sunset Hills Tour of Historic Homes

Join us in Celebrating National Preservation Month! Preservation Greensboro's Fourteenth Annual Tour of Historic Homes & Gardens will celebrate Sunset Hills in its centennial year by opening vintage homes throughout the neighborhood during May, National Historic Preservation Month.

Our event is Saturday, May 18, and Sunday May 19, 2024. Tour magazines with maps and house history will be available as part of the ticket price.

"One hundred years ago, the woodlands and old dairy farm on the far western edge of Greensboro were redeveloped as a neighborhood of wide boulevards with parks, mature trees, and both modest and grand houses," says Benjamin Briggs, executive director of Preservation Greensboro. "The legacy of this neighborhood has been transformative for Greensboro, both in establishing the majestic approach of West Market Street to our center city from the west and in terms of the wealth of character-defining architecture and craftsmanship that sets Greensboro within a league of much larger cities."

Sunset Hills was listed to the National Register of Historic Places in 2013 and today it remains the largest such district in Guilford County. The in-person tour will highlight the architecture and charms of this neighborhood by opening historic houses that are rarely accessible to the public.

Pre-sale tickets are now available on our website! All tickets for the Tour are for both days. You must have a ticket to enter each home. After you purchase your ticket, you can pick them up starting May 1st at Blandwood Museum, 447 West Washington St., Greensboro, NC 27401. If you are not able to pick them up before the event, the will-call will be at Tour headquarters. The headquarters is at 1903 Madison Ave. Please do not come to this private home outside of Tour hours. Ticket sales are final and non-refundable. 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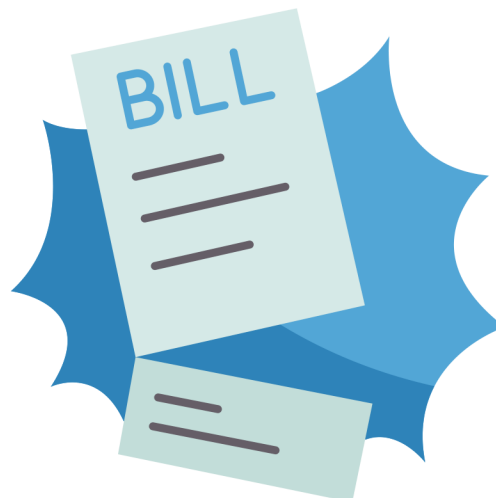
